HERO WORSHIP

• Americans became fascinated with heroes in the 1920's because they longed for the values of the "good old days".



CHARLES LINDBERGH

 In 1927 Charles Lindbergh flew his specially built plane (The Spirit of Saint Louis) nonstop across the Atlantic from NY to Paris in 33 ¹/₂ hours.



⁶⁶LUCKY LINDY⁹⁹



- No co-pilot or navigation equipment.
- Americans everywhere followed his flight.
- Celebrated as a national hero.
- He remained modest and refused millions in publicity fees.
- Stuck to solid moral values of the "good old days".

AMELIA EARHART

- First woman to cross the Atlantic alone (1932).
- Disappeared over the Pacific in 1937 attempting to fly around the world.



SPORTS HEROES

- Jack Dempsey became the heavyweight boxing champion of the world in the 1920's.
- Babe Ruth set homerun and pitching records in baseball.



MASS MEDIA

- A means of communicating information to large numbers of people.
- People from different regions of the country began to learn about each other's cultures. (They didn't travel around much or talk to each other)



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THE MOVIE INDUSTRY

- 100 million/week went to the movies.
- Total population was only 125 million.
- Didn't even have sound ("talkies") until 1927. (The Jazz Singer)
- Number of theatres quadrupled between 1910 - 1920.





NEWSPAPERS AND RADIO

• Created a common culture because people read about the same events and were influenced by the same ideas (fashions, sports events, etc.).







Different from other forms of music because it relies on improvisation (making up music as you play it).



THE "JAZZ AGE"

1920's were referred to as this because the times were energetic and full of life just like Jazz music.



SPREAD OF JAZZ MUSIC

 Although it originated in New Orleans, Jazz music became the rage among young people all across the country because of the radio.

● Jazz filled 2/3rds of all radio airtime.



JAZZ CLUBS

● Many were located in **Harlem in NYC**.

- The Cotton Club was most famous.
- Mostly white audiences.
- Louis Armstrong "Satchmo".
- Duke Ellington "The Duke".



HARLEM RENAISSANCE

Movement of black artists and writers in NYC's Harlem neighborhood.

Many open-minded white artists/writers mingled with them.



2ND CLASS CITIZENS?

- After seeing the French not discriminate after WWI they were unwilling to accept second class citizenship.
- Not so much discriminated against as failed to be seen - like they were invisible.



LANGSTON HUGHES

 Black Poet who spoke with a clear, strong voice about the joys and difficulties of being human, being American, and being black
